## **Toboggan winner Calibrachoa continues to blossom**

Repole Stable's Calibrachoa edged past Independence War in the final 70 yards to score a well-deserved half-length victory in the 118th running of the \$98,000 Toboggan Stakes (G3) on January 22 at Aqueduct.

Making his graded stakes debut, the four-year old Southern Image



colt covered six furlongs in 1:09.74 on the Jamaica, New York, track's ice-rimmed inner dirt surface, which was listed as fast.

Calibrachoa entered off his first stakes score, a 1½-length triumph on December 18 in the six-furlong Gravesend Stakes, also at Aqueduct.

The dark bay or brown colt was claimed for \$40,000 one

start earlier in November on behalf of his current connections. First or second in each of his past eight races, he has now captured half of his 12 lifetime starts and pushed his bankroll to \$220,540

Calibrachoa was bred in Kentucky by Nelson Bunker Hunt. Conversely, most of his immediate family tree has Florida-based roots.

He is the youngest of four winners from five starters out of the winning Montbrook mare Fort Lauderdale, who was best at two when third in the Sorrento Stakes (G2).

Fort Lauderdale's key relation is as half sister to the dam of Grade 1-winning sire Bellamy Road. Further back, this family has issued

the likes of Grade 1 winners Versaillles Treaty and Gold Fever.

Even further back, Calibrachoa's sixth dam. Exclusive Dancer, is a full sister to 1978-1979 leading sire Exclusive Native.

Calibrachoa hails from the first crop of the multiple Grade 1-winning Halo's Image stallion

Southern Image and represents his sire's first graded stakes winner.

Southern Image stood his first four Northern Hemisphere seasons in Kentucky at Taylor Made Stallions with additional annual shuttle duties in Australia. In 2010, he was relocated to Rancho San Miguel in California, where his fee is listed at \$4,000 for 2011.

Albeit a five generation outcross, Calibrachoa's extended pedigree reveals a valuable inbreeding pattern—both of our subject's grandsires are members of the same family.

His paternal grandsire, Halo's Image, and his maternal grandsire, Montbrook, both trace back to Old Bess, a key matriarch for Ocala Stud. She is the fourth dam of the former and third dam to the latter.

As previously noted in previous columns, duplication of strains from this relatively obscure matron continues to present itself in a disproportionate number of superior individuals.

Speaking of families, should anyone ask, Calibrachoa is named after a genus of plants closely related to the petunia.
