Caracortado and his sire make the grade in Robert B. Lewis

Caracortado, a three-year-old gelding whose name comes from the Spanish word for "scarface", preserved his unblemished race record by rolling past the well-regarded Tiznow colts Tiz Chrome and American Lion in upper stretch en route to a sparkling 1¾-length victory in the \$150,000 Robert B. Lewis Stakes (G2) at Santa Anita Park on February 13.



The 1½-mile Lewis was Caracortado's first graded stakes triumph and his fifth overall win, all by daylight.

Caracortado entered off of a sharp 1%-length score in the California Breeders' Champion Stakes at Santa Anita on December 26. The athletic chestnut has been climbing the ladder since making his debut last September in a \$40,000 maiden claiming race at Fairplex Park.

Bred in California by his co-owner and trainer, Mike Machowsky, Caracortado's pedigree might be considered light on racing class as his sire and first two dams combined to win just a single race.

He is the first starter out of the unraced Maria's Mon mare Mons Venus, who also is the dam of a yearling filly by Southern Image.

So far, daughters of Maria's Mon have yielded a total of three graded or group stakes winners, two by sons of Storm Cat.

Most of the success realized by Coracortado's immediate family has come with two-year-olds. His unplaced grandam, Bid to the Mint, by Key to the Mint, produced 1992 Bay Meadows Lassie Stakes winner Jaded Pleasure, by Jade Hunter.

Prior to the Lewis, the most celebrated member of this tribe was Caracortado's third dam, Cautious Bidder, who captured four stakes as a two-year old, including the 1971 Hollywood Lassie Stakes.

Caracortado's extended American family traces back to his distinguished 15th dam, *Gallopade. Imported and sent to Alabama around 1833, *Gallopade is matriarch to more inductees into the Racing Hall of Fame (11) than any other broodmare in history.

Caracortado hails from the second crop of Cat Dreams and represents his sire's first stakes and graded stakes winner.

Cat Dreams stands for \$1,500 in his first season at Still Creek Farms in Brookville, Indiana, after spending five years at stud in California. He has 16 winners from 38 starters in his first two crops.

A \$475,000 Keeneland September yearling sale purchase, starcrossed Cat Dreams scored by eight lengths at Churchill Downs in his only start at age two. He subsequently was retired with a careerending injury.

His son Caracortado may not enjoy the luxury of a "Derby-friendly" pedigree, but as the name suggests, one would be unwise not to take him seriously.
