Get Serious reaffirms his affinity for Monmouth turf course

After wresting the lead from multiple Grade 1 winner and race favorite Presious Passion, Get Serious extended his advantage around the far turn and then repelled a late charge from runner-up Roman Tiger to score a commanding 1½-length victory in the \$255,000 Monmouth Stakes (G3) on June 12.

Sent off as the 7-to-1 fifth choice in the field of nine, the six-year-old City Zip gelding completed 1½ miles in 1:47.11 on firm turf.



GET SERIOUS

Get Serious improved to eight victories from ten starts on the Monmouth turf course. Last year, he captured the one-mile Elkwood and Battlefield Stakes, each in course-record time. Later in the season, he won his first graded stakes, the Red Bank Stakes (G3), also at a mile on the grass at Monmouth.

A winner of five of his last six starts. Get Serious has 11 wins

from 27 career starts and earnings of \$740,691.

Bred in New York by Morgan's Ford Farm, the chestnut gelding fetched \$130,000 at the Fasig-Tipton Midlantic Eastern fall yearling sale.

Get Serious hails from the second crop of City Zip and currently ranks as his sire's highest earner.

Last Saturday proved especially rewarding for City Zip as little more than an hour before the Monmouth Stakes, three-year-old Gleam of Hope surged from last to first to win the Jefferson Cup Stakes (G3) at Churchill Downs.

It is worth noting the remarkable proportion of the Carson City stallion's best runners who share his chestnut coat. To date, seven of his nine graded stakes winners and 21 of his 26 total stakes winners are chestnuts. As a general rule, contemporary chestnut stallions sire slightly less than 50% chestnut offspring.

Get Serious is one of five winners from seven starters out of the

winning Java Gold mare Java Gal, a half sister to Allez Milord, by Tom Rolfe, winner of the 1986 Puma Europa Preis (Ger-G1) and '87 Oak Tree Invitational Handicap (G1) and later a sire in Japan.

Java Gal also is the dam of stakes-placed winner Java Warrior, by Cape Town, and a yearling Rahy colt.

Further back, the family includes Grade 1 winner Royal Ski, by Raja Baba, also a sire in Japan.

Perhaps, the most interesting aspect of Get Serious' pedigree is the relationship between his tail-female line and closest pattern of inbreeding. In particular, his fifth dam, Flaring Top, also serves as the grandam of breed-shaping sire Nijinsky II, to whom our subject in inbred 5x4.

As such, what looks like inbreeding to Nijinsky II is really inbreeding to the family of Nijinsky II. Good stuff.
