## More of the same from The Usual Q. T. in Eddie Read

The Usual Q. T. advanced his standing among the nation's leading turf runners with an explosive turn of foot in deep stretch to draw away by two lengths in the \$300,000 Eddie Read Stakes (G1) on July 24 at Del Mar.

Hollywood Derby (G1), Oak Tree Derby (G2) and Sir Beaufort Stakes (G3).

A remarkably consistent yet improving bay gelding, his career earnings stand at \$993,320 in three seasons on the track.

The Usual Q. T. is the first starter out of the Western Fame mare Lunge, a multiple winner at age three and a full sister to Western Act, a four-time stakes winner at Turf Paradise.

The Usual Q. T. is from a long-standing, albeit relatively uncelebrated, California-based family. His Eddie Read victory establishes him as the most illustrious member of his extended tribe—one that traces back to our subject's sixth dam, the classically bred Blue Cloth, by Blue Larkspur, out of a Man o' War mare.

Blue Cloth's daughter, The Usual Q. T.'s fifth dam, Kick Pleat, is the dam of several important winners, including Today 'n Tomorrow, hero of the 1977 Sunset Handicap (G1).

The Usual Q. T. hails from the eighth crop of the Nureyev stallion Unusual Heat and is the richest of his sire's nine graded stakes winners.

The Golden State's leading turf sire since 2004, Unusual Heat's fortunes have soared since California's wholesale switch to synthetic surfaces. As such, he appears well on his way to a third consecutive overall state sire title.

Almost black in color, Unusual Heat will commence stud duty in 2011 at Harris Farms in Coalinga.

Not readily apparent from the five-cross pedigree, which appears above, The Usual Q. T. conveys one of the most identifiable patterns among top-level turf performers: the accumulation of strains from the grass-loving family of \*Rough Shod II, who is the third dam of Nureyev, The Usual Q. T.'s paternal grandsire.

On the bottom half of his pedigree, \*Rough Shod II contributes two additional strains. She is the fourth dam of Topsider, Western Fame's broodmare sire. A second dose is via Golden Act's grandam, Retsinato, whose sire, Ridan, is a full brother to Thong, Nureyev's grandam.

Although far less specific as an indicator of overall quality, inbreeding to Northern Dancer also has tended to generate individuals with a preference for turf and all-weather surfaces rather than dirt.
