## Uncle Mo pours it on in Champagne Stakes romp

Repole Stable's Uncle Mo established himself as a leading contender in the juvenile male division with a resounding 4%-length victory in the 139th running of the Champagne Stakes (G1) on October 10 at Belmont Park.

The robust Indian Charlie colt was clocked in 1:34.51 for the oneturn mile—the fastest time since Devil's Bag, a subsequent juvenile

champion, set the stakes record (1:34.20) in 1983.

Inaugurated in 1867, the Champagne remains the longest-running stakes for two-

vear olds in North America.

Uncle Mo was sent off as the prohibitive 1-to-5 favorite, a valuation based largely on the colt's maiden debut at Saratoga Race Course, when he turned in one of the most impressive per-

formances by a two-year old this summer, bounding off by 14½ lengths in a maiden special weight race on the Travers Stakes (G1) undercard on August 28.

Bred in Kentucky by D. Michael Cavey D.V.M., Uncle Mo was a \$220,000 purchase at the 2009 Keeneland September yearling sale. His name is sports slang for "momentum," an invaluable asset this colt now enjoys as he prepares for the Grey Goose Breeders' Cup Juvenile (G1) on November 6 at Churchill Downs.

Uncle Mo descends from a relatively quiet branch of a once highly

influential American family (#8-c) originally developed by premier breeders James R. Keene and Harry Payne Whitney. As such, our subject already has become the most accomplished descendant under his first seven dams.

Uncle Mo is one of three winners from as many starters out of the Arch mare Playa Maya, who won three of her six starts at ages three and four when she also achieved minor stakesplacings.

Playa Maya's dam, Dixie Slippers, is a half sister to Grade 3 winner Woods of Windsor.

Uncle Mo hails from the ninth crop of popular Airdrie Stud stallion Indian Charlie, who also has been represented in 2010 by multiple Grade 3 winner Conveyance.

Indian Charlie has done particularly well with mares carrying the blood of Hail to Reason, a key ancestor who, not coincidentally, descends from the same family as the former's broodmare sire

Leo Castelli. Specifically, Hail to Reason's 1951 Acorn Stakes-winning dam Nothird-chance also serves as the third dam of Leo Castelli.

So far, the Hail to Reason line appears in the pedigrees of four of Indian Charlie's ten American graded stakes winners (40%), almost twice the frequency observed in the general broodmare population.
